After spending 30 years at (Grant) MacEwan, from 1972 to 2002, in various positions as instructor, department head, outreach administrator and dean in the Division of Arts and Science, I retired early at age 61. I was fortunate to watch MacEwan grow from a storefront operation to a major player on the educational scene in Edmonton, and to be directly involved in its growth as President of the Faculty Association, Member of the Board of Governors, and Chairman of Academic Council.

Transition into retirement came easy. I had prepared for it by learning a new language, Spanish, and qualifying as dive master. I organized and led dive trips from Edmonton to Central America and Mexico and worked for a while in a dive center on one of the Bay Islands in Honduras.

In January 2006, I moved to Mexico, to be closer to my dive destinations. At first, I lived in the Sierra Madre of Sonora, then moved to Puerto Morelos, half an hour south of Cancun, by the beach and often did not wear shoes for a whole week.

For the last eight years, I have been residing with my cat in a place called Ajijic on the shores of Lake Chapala, the largest fresh water lake of Mexico, at an altitude of 1500 meters, and about 50 km south of Guadalajara. Here we have a large and vibrant expatriate community, with a daily schedule of cultural, social, educational and artistic activities. My own contribution to the community is being the moderator of a weekly group of Conversaciones en Español, which I started 7 years ago. I also work with a music organization that organizes and sells trip tickets to the symphony, ballet, and live Met opera transmissions.

The climate is ideal: warm in the winter, hot in the summer, but always cool at night, with a rainy season in June through September. Life here is safe, despite of what you may read in the papers, and cheap. I rent a fully furnished two-bedroom house for less than 500 CAD a month. Public health insurance is about 35 dollars a month which includes free visits to a doctor, medication and hospital stay if necessary.

I paint and write and, with the international airport only half an hour away, I travel a lot, mostly in Europe and South America. My last trip took me to Chile for a month. My next travel plan is to drive from Chapala to Cozumel in December for a week of scuba diving. The drive takes three days each way.

Work at MacEwan was good to me, and life after MacEwan is just as good.

We couldn't let people think this project was on hold, which it was! In fact, active political forces were looking for the opportunity to kill it. Fortunately, we had an equally active board and Premier Don Getty on our side. Activity on the site was needed! Fifty foot letters urged "Go Oilers Go" during the 1989 Stanley Cup playoffs. Three months later, an exact scale chalked outline of the City Centre Campus appeared on the site. Of course, it was noticed by the downtown business community from their high-rise office windows, as well as by MLAs who regularly flew over the site to land at Edmonton's municipal airport.⁷²

Travel Tips

The following information has been provided by Wendy Vranas – a Travel Consultant with Transat Travel as well as a Sessional Instructor in the Travel Consultant Program at MacEwan University.

Purchasing travel insurance is one of the most important things you should do before leaving on your trip. Travel can mean encountering the unexpected, ranging from the inconvenient to the truly serious. In a medical emergency, **call the number immediately** that is on the front of your insurance card. You need to present the card at the hospital, but the call is critical to starting the claim process. By starting the claim process, you may avoid paying any costs personally. Some insurance coverage will even send a doctor to visit you in the comfort of your hotel room, which is much better than waiting in a foreign hospital.

For those of us 60 years and over, we should shop around for our medical coverage. Plans and rates change from year to year with all insurance providers. We should be especially diligent regarding pre-existing conditions. There are also annual plans for those who take several trips a year; these types of plans can provide excellent value. Whether you travel by land, air or sea, for fun or work, medical coverage is essential. Before travelling, check with your medical provider to determine whether you may require additional insurance during your travels.
